
Nathaniel Irving

Born June 16, 1948

Killed in Action February 8, 1969

Nathaniel Irving was born on June 16, 1948, the son of Mrs. Luverster Irving Grammer and Nathaniel White, and step-son of James Grammer. He had a daughter, Connie, born six months after he was killed. In addition, Nathaniel had six sisters: Jennie, Eliza, Florence, Catherine, Irene and Joyce, and five brothers: William, Robert, James, Eugene and John. Nathaniel, nicknamed "Mayner", enjoyed playing basketball, as well as having fun with his friends and family. He was raised in Prince George County and was a member of Harrison Grove Baptist Church. During his school years he attended Old Academy School, Harrison Grove School and J.E.J. Moore High School.

Before entering military service, Nathaniel worked at Hughes Dry Cleaners in Hopewell. Nathaniel entered military service on June 17, 1968, and was trained as Airborne Infantry. He was assigned to the 75th Infantry, 4th Infantry Division. His tour of duty in Vietnam started on December 8, 1968 and he was killed on February 8, 1969, just two months later. Nathaniel's remains were returned home where, after funeral services were conducted at Harrison Grove Baptist Church, he was interred at the City Point National Cemetery in Hopewell, VA with full military honors.





Below: Postcard from Nathaniel to his Mother while he was in training at Ft Polk, Louisiana.





It was with profound regret that I learned of the death of your son, Private First Class Nathaniel Irving.


